READ: GALATIANS 5: 22-23

She confessed: The unintentional consequence of her choices and habits was loss of purpose and loss of health.

She chose Lent to begin her journey toward health. She learned new habits, set new goals, and sometimes stumbled along the way. Key to progress was intentionality, community, and compassion. She practiced daily time with God in Scripture and prayer. Eventually a door to a healthy future and purpose opened before her.

The 40 day Lenten journey is a season for discerning and living into a spiritually healthy future toward which God is calling. It's a time to invite the spirit to fill our lives with love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control.

This journey may require changing thoughts, attitudes, and habits or allowing God to fill dark spaces in our lives, or developing practices for healthy living.

Frederick Buechner reminds us, "during Lent, Christians are supposed to ask one way or another what it means to be themselves."

Reflection: Who is God calling you to be now? What habits can God help you change that will open the door to God's future for you to grow and to serve?

Prayer: Lord, you call me to journey with you and with others. I turn to you to unlock the doors of my future. Help me to hear your call. Help me to live a life of love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. Amen.

THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 18TH, 2021

READ: MARK 12: 30-31

We all finished our prayer and said, "I Love You and good night". As Denise and I were preparing to get the girls tucked into their beds, one of them said, "P.S. – God can you make sure all your precious children have somebody to tell them they are precious? AMEN".

Denise and I walked out of their rooms, smiled, and held hands as we walked to finish our household chores in preparation for the next day. As we finished straightening up the Den, Denise began to sing. "Jesus loves the little children, all the children of the world. Every child in every land, Jesus holds them in His hand, Jesus loves the little children of the world."

What if, as followers of Jesus -We "lived into" the commandment and lived it out with ALL God's Precious Children?

READ: JEREMIAH 31: 13

READ: 2 PETER 1: 5-7

Patience is one of those attributes that you cannot attain by reading about. It is a quality that can only be acquired by persistent practice. It is a drill that I must do daily.

The original Webster's dictionary offers this definition of patience: "the suffering of afflictions, pain, toil, calamity, provocation or other evil, with a calm, unruffled temperament; endurance without murmuring or fretfulness, from a kind of heroic pride, or from a Christian submission to the divine will."

Two things strike me. First, "endurance without murmuring." I get so frustrated when something interrupts me when I am trying to get somewhere in a hurry, a train for instance. Forced to just sit there and count the cars, wasting precious minutes when I have somewhere to be.

Yet, what an opportunity for me to choose to quench the inner fumes, and use the delay to work on my patience. Maybe, pray about patience?

The second thing to strike me was, "a Christian submission to the divine will." How many times are we forced to deal with an impossible situation or person? These circumstances are always opportunities to grow in patience, to learn to submit to God's providential will, and often, to minster in some special way.

Is your patience being tested today? Great!! Remember, love is first of all patient (1 Cor. 13:4). The Lord is training you toward godliness, and godliness is moving toward perfect love. He really wants to work this quality into your character. In perfect love we can transform the world around us for His glory.

Yet we are told in verse 18 of today's scripture, "So we don't look at the troubles we can see now; rather, we fix our gaze on things that cannot be seen. For the things we see now will soon be gone. But the things we cannot see will last forever."

Are we to only keep our eyes dimly lit on things now; and clearly focused on things we cannot see, but hope for in the ever after? John Ashcroft in, Letters from a Father to His Son once shared, "Dad prayed that our hearts would be ignited and inspired to do things of eternal consequence. ... To turn our eyes from the temporal, the physical, and the menial. ... He prayed, toward the eternal, the spiritual, and the noble."

Yet there is one thing we can do in the meantime as we walk towards eternity. We can be extenders of kindness with one another. I was once told by a child with bright eyes that, "Love is something you give away; and it comes right back to you! ... It's like a shiny penny, hold it tight and you won't get any!" Well, the same applies with kindness. It doesn't take much to perform random acts of kindness during the Lenten season and beyond. Maybe pay it forward in the Starbucks line, or smile at a stranger in the car next to you; the opportunities are limitless!



Prayer: Lord, may we be more inclined to share kindness with others who may simply need a tender touch of care. And may we seek less to be heard; but to hear the cries of those around us and respond with the heart of You. Amen.

READ: HEBREWS 13: 16

I have long pondered why these are the stories that most attract me to read, watch, and think about. As I examined the "why," I realized that the answer is pretty simple. I love these "geek" stories because at their heart, they are all stories of the epic battle between **GOOD** and **EVIL**.

The listing of goodness as a fruit has also made me ponder often. Why list being good? Isn't that just too obvious? Many people try to teach us right from wrong, good from evil, and we hear that good always triumphs in the end. We're told that most people are good by nature.

So why include this no-brainer of goodness in the fruit of the Spirit?

In the original Greek, we find that this word for goodness is not used anywhere outside of the Bible. There's something unique about this word beyond our usual good/evil dichotomy. The scholars say this goodness means, "properly, intrinsic goodness, ... the goodness that comes from God and shows itself in spiritual, moral excellence."

This isn't just a generic good. This is God's goodness found in us. God's goodness that has been given to us. And as the author of Hebrews shares, we can't keep what God has given to us, to ourselves. It needs to be shared. We take the goodness of God found inside of us, and direct outward in spiritual and moral excellence. What a task we have before us. May we all be up to the challenge.

READ: GALATIANS 5:22-23

"They'll know we are Christians by our
love."

The ascension shows us that we do not yet follow Jesus to glory, though we will someday. But it also reminds us to love one another as we wait.



The foster family had agreed to keep him until they found an adopted home for him. Now, hey said they had a change of heart and wanted the little boy.

The case worker told me that I could hire an attorney and allow a judge to make the decision. So I did, and the court date was set. Now please remember, I had never met the child but I knew God had opened so happened, I would trust Him. It's a lot easier saying that now, but to be honest, it was the longest and most painful couple of weeks.

Sunday night, Tuck went back to the foster family because I had our summer youth camp leaving for Dayton in the morning. It was the longest week of my life. We pulled back into town around 5:00 and I picked Tuck up around 6:15. That day, life began with Mickey having a 3 year old.

I was baptized as a dad by Tuck that first needed to go to the bathroom, We needed to make our way right then, not after a few minutes. As I carried him to the restroom, I learned a very important lesson. Listen to him when he tells he has to go to the bathroom, or carry extra shirts for myself.

How does this relate to Lent and our relationship with God? In John 1:12, John tells us that we have the right to be called a child of God. With all of my boys I explain this verse in this way. When we put our faith in God, we become adopted by God. Because this adoption is a right, no one can take us away from God. God loves us, and shows what real love is when he died on the cross. We can possess patience only through the power of the Holy Spirit. It is a gift, a fruit of the Spirt that is placed within the hearts of those who love the Lord and believe in Jesus' life, death, and resurrection.

So, when we make the right choice to be patient, how are we to wait? Read and think on His Word every day— you will never be sorry. Actively do what is right in His sight, assume your responsibilities, and refrain from wrongdoing and wrong thinking. Seek the Lord…; Call upon Him…; Be still, and know that He is God.

PRAYER: All powerful, knowing, and loving God, faithful even in our unfaithfulness, forgive us and set our feet firmly on the path you would have us to go. Open our ears and our hearts to know when to go, when to proceed with caution, and when to stop and wait. We trust in your timing, your provision. Our hope is in You, and we thank you for this Lenten time to reflect on your compassion toward us, your patience, and we wait, committed, and expectantly looking for Your glorious return. Amen.

As in several times past, I reached down and cradled his small body and lovely black and white wings between my hands, hoping to feel a heartbeat. It wasn't obvious, his eyes were drooping, and I feared he was dying. I walked about, keeping him warm and stroking his tiny head with a finger, softly begging him to live. Momentarily his round eyes opened. His body became tense with a flutter of his wings! I moved to a nearby bush, inviting him to perch, released my hands and he instantly flew to a tree! JOY!

So, what brings us joy? Yes, such a moment as that, as well as reaching out to our hurting fellow human beings! We all have experiences and feel the pleasure of giving and helping others. Such joys are blessings from above and mirror the teachings of Jesus we find throughout the New Testament. We marvel at His Miracles! But in our quiet and human way, we "do the small stuff" and receive the blessings of joy in return.

Years ago a New England Poet, Emily Dickinson, wrote, "Hope is a thing with feathers that perches in the soul," another nod to our avian fellow creatures, and the thought makes me smile!

That interview created headlines nationwide and Carter himself said it may have narrowed his lead in the presidential race. Self control helps us create a consistent prayer life.

There is wisdom in the alcoholic who knows step one to stop drinking is never walking through the door of the liquor store. The person struggling to lose weight gets a gold star from me when they skip KFC for a healthier meal at Subway. That does take self control. The key to success is changing our desires, but that does not come easy.

About a year ago, my dentist yelled at me for my poor flossing. My gums were bleeding and I seldom ever flossed. So I started doing it. At the age of 61, I made something a habit that was by no means habitual.

If self control can make that happen, it can also lead me to read the Bible more, pray more, be kinder, be quieter, and be more helpful. So brothers and sisters, let us think of self control as a way to practice positive behaviors that bring us closer to God and to our loved ones. It's a fruit, not a harness.

Revised Standard Version - And we exhort you, brethren, admonish the idlers, encourage the fainthearted, help the weak, be patient with them all.

Newer version or old, God's message is the same - Be Patient with Everyone!

How will you and I live into the future God hopes for us even when we don't know now what we will know one day? How will we have faith?

MAUNDY THURSDAY, APRIL 1ST, 2021

READ: I CORINTHIANS 11:24-25

Almost seven years ago, I had a privilege of going to the Holy Land for the first time. Not on a tour but on foot with a backpack. I felt like just from reading the Bible and deep into biblical archeology that I was stepping into a familiar territory. My goal was to walk where Jesus walked from Nazareth to Capernaum and all over Jerusalem, especially the Old City.

We averaged about 15-20 miles a day on foot and I can show you the pictures of bloody blisters and dangling toe nails, but what I didn't and couldn't capture on camera remains to this day most vivid in my memory: the hospitality of people who hosted us, a Catholic couple who traveled thousands of miles to celebrate their 75th wedding anniversary at the Wedding Chapel of Cana, a whole community harvesting olives together, cactus walls which divided Arabs and Jews, running up the Snake Path to see the sunrise at Masada, etc. I really expected that I would be so attracted and impressed by the ruins of the old, but I was equally wowed by people, new constructions, and museums.

One of the most memorable incidents from this trip comes from an unexpected place, The Church of Holy Sepulchre. I say "unexpected," but what is unexpected about it? After all, it is the holiest site of Christianity. But this mortal, this skeptic went into it thinking, "This can't be the place where Jesus was buried and resurrected! It is too close to the city and too close to the Temple Mount." My head was full of Wikipedia, and my heart was full of doubt.

The moment I walked in, I was completely taken up by the mystery of the place, by the smell of burial spices, a large stone (The Stone of Unction), the way sunshine entered through the window and holes in that dark space, and then by the wailing of women. I found myself on my knees wailing with the women. It took me to the mystery of the very first Holy Saturday.

We are mortal, few of days, full of trouble, limited and ignorant. But when we believe, God takes us from Holy Saturday to glorious Easter!

EASTER SUNDAY, APRIL 4TH, 2021

READ: 1 PETER 1:3
