Message from Bishop and Cabinet on Rising Numbers of COVID-19 Cases in Our Region

In light of the dramatic increases in COVID-19 throughout our region, we encourage you to review your plans considering these rising

numbers.

Dear North Georgia United Methodists,

Last week (written the beginning of July) Governor Kemp extended Georgia's Public Health State of Emergency and has banned gatherings of more than 50 people unless there is at least 6 feet of space between each person. We know that many of you have worked for weeks developing a plan for how to gather for inperson worship. In light of the dramatic increases in COVID-19 throughout our region, we encourage you to review your plan considering these rising numbers. Churches in areas with rapidly increasing cases should prayerfully consider pausing plans to gather in-person until the numbers go down. Those in doubt should err on the side of safety.

The website <u>globalepidemics.org</u> offers a county-level risk assessment. We urge you not to gather if your county is red or orange-level risk and to take extreme care where there is a yellow-level risk. (See Page 7.)

We encourage and support you:

- If you have resumed in-person worship, but because of an increase of cases in your area you feel you need to pause and return to online worship.
- If you are considering gathering in person in July but feel you need to delay reopening.
- If you plan on focusing on online worship and stewardship for the foreseeable future. For churches that are planning on gathering in-person for worship, we emphasize that congregational singing is extremely dangerous and that choirs should not be part of worship at this time. We reiterate the guidelines we have released (<a href="https://www.ngumc.org/guidelines-and-consideration-for-in-person-worship">https://www.ngumc.org/guidelines-and-consideration-for-in-person-worship</a>). Three variables to consider are:
  - *People:* Confidence that members will be disciplined about social distancing (from car, to entering, to exiting, to return to car), wearing masks, and hand hygiene. Reports indicate that this might be the most critical variable.
  - Place: The size and configuration of the space. Note that for many churches 25 or fewer is a safer number.
  - *Things:* Availability of supplies (masks/hand sanitizer).

Inside gatherings of any size should be held only where the demographics, facilities, and the actual practices of members can reasonably mitigate the spread of the virus. If you want to talk this over with someone, please don't hesitate to reach out to your District Superintendent or Conference Staff.

Our prayers are with you as we navigate how to share God's love in the communities we serve in ever-changing circumstances.

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

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## **Pastor's Page**



Negro Spirituals are the hymns created by Africans who were captured and brought to America to be sold into slavery. I have always loved to sing them, but it was not until recently after getting married and having children that I really started understanding how strong, soulful, and spiritual they are. I understand a little bit, not completely, not fully, but a little bit better of what it means to be captured, be moved thousands of miles, be forcefully separated from family and native land, etc.. It is not a dramatization in any way when I say that when I am going through a tough time, the first thing I do is to sing Spirituals. This month, August 2020, I will be preaching on Job

through the lens of some of my favorite Spirituals. These are the hymns I have been singing at the top of my lungs during this pandemic.

It is so ironic that these African slaves started living and loving the religion of their masters. To me, it proves the power and mystery of God even more. In the midst of our suffering and agony, God really comes through time and time again. When this pandemic hit, I was at a loss. In my extreme lows, I thought to myself that my life as a parish minister was over, and I needed to be something else. To a person who became a Christian minister right out of college and has known nothing but ministry and Gospel, this put me on the edge of a cliff. I did not have manyh skills in online worship, video editing, and high tech stuff in general. Plus, my goal in life was not a tele-evangelist! To be honest, I was quite discouraged and overwhelmed. As I was struggling through those deep, dark tunnels, I sang with Rev. James Cleveland, "I don't feel no ways tired, I've come too far from where I started from. Nobody told me that the road would be easy, I don't believe He brought me this far to leave me." At the top of my lungs! To the point that my children held my hand and said, "Mama, you are embarrassing me!"

Slaves were prohibited from learning to read and write, so Spirituals were created extemporaneously and were passed orally from person to person. Let me rephrase it:, they did not even know how to read or write let alone music theory, knowledge in melody, tempo, and tone structure, etc., yet they created the strongest, most soulful, and most spiritual music. And there are over 6,000 Spirituals. Just amazing! As you realize, there are many, many Spirituals missing from the list below including my staple, "Give Me Jesus," which is my all time favorite. But my hope and prayer is that this sermon series helps you in your difficult time! I encourage all of you to listen to the lyrics of these hymns and learn to sing them. Now there are so many excellent recordings on YouTube! Furthermore, I encourage you to add to this list your favorites and let me know what they are. Spirituals have been a tool for me to reaffirm God's calling for my life and regain strength and strengthen my faith in God's providence. Instead of standing on the edge of the cliff, I have the edge over fear and anxiety in this challenging time because of these Spirituals.

Let me sing it again, "I don't feel no ways tired! I've come too far from where I started from. Nobody told me that the road would be easy, I don't believe He brought me this far to leave me." Amen.

Adversity usually makes us grow in ways we don't enjoy experiencing. During the past five month of life under COVID-19, all of us have probably learned a little bit more about ourselves, our loved ones and our community. Not all of that has been pleasant. I have learned that stressful times can bring out the best and the worst in all of us. I admire those who are in the first group because I often fall in the second. I have been grumpy, angry and impatient for much of the past two months. For me, the past five months have been an inconvenience that I have turned into a hardship because of my attitude. Meanwhile, I know that many people in our church are really suffering because of forces beyond their control. For them I pray.

If things go as planned, we will be welcoming a new grandchild into the world on Monday, August 3. Beth and I, of course, won't be at the hospital but we will be staying with Michael and Gretchen to mostly have fun with our 2-year-old granddaughter. We are both looking forward to it. We have been self-quarantined for most of the last month as precaution.

Hopefully, I have learned a thing or two about what is really important. That is one of those hard lessons you learn when life throws a wrench in your plans. This morning and every morning, some members of our church are ill, sad, lonely and scared. We might not be able to embrace them with our arms, but we can call them just to say hello or send them a note. I have learned that little acts of kindness aren't necessarily little. May God bless all of you.



#### MORE THAN 700 CLERGY GATHER FOR VIRTUAL CLERGY EXECUTIVE SESSION

"More than 700 North Georgia Conference clergy and members of the Board of Ministry gathered online July 16 for our first-ever virtual Clergy Executive Session. Bishop Sue Haupert-Johnson presided over the session and was joined by Director of the Center for Clergy Excellence Bernice Kirkland, Conference Secretary Donn Ann Weber, Chair of the Board of Ministry Julie Boone, and Executive Assistant to the Bishop Terry Walton.

Attendees of the session sang, prayed, celebrated, and cast electronic votes using a secure online meeting and voting platform. The same system will be used for the <u>virtual Annual Conference session August 29</u>.

A highlight of the session was the announcement of the Dr. Glenn L. Ethridge Scholarship Endowment for United Methodist students with priority given to those attending Gammon Theological Seminary and Candler School of Theology. 'Glenn has served with integrity and grace for many years as the Chair of the Board of Ministry and he exemplifies the finest leadership qualities of the annual conference,' said Boone. 'The Board wants to express their gratitude in a way that would impact new clergy in the years ahead and so, through the generosity of Board members, local churches, individuals, family and foundations, we would like to present through the Georgia United Methodist Foundation, the Dr. Glenn L. Ethridge Scholarship Endowment.'


