

A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR



We are at the threshold of the busiest month of our church, and I can't say enough how excited I am. I have all the volunteers for the Night in Bethlehem and I did not have to twist any arms except maybe Greg Gaston, our Finance Chair. It will be an event where we get to know the children of our community and open up our church for them to "know Christ." How exciting is that?

It is radical that God came to us in flesh and bones in Jesus Christ. We have always just taken it all in and accepted it without question so the radicalness of the incarnation is somewhat doused. But God coming to live among us has a huge implication in our faith. It means God came to us in a real time and place, and to real people. God chose when, where, and to whom to be born with an intention and meaning. He was born in Palestine where they did not even have their own

country; they were part of the Rome Empire as a colony. In a tight and close family system like in Palestine, for Joseph to go to his hometown, and go from inn to inn looking for lodging with his very pregnant wife implicates so much more than just a "poor" couple in a strange place. God was born into a peasant family which belonged to the 99%, the poor, and the bottom of the social and economic tier. He was born among the poor, grew up with the poor, identified with the poor, and had a special preference for the poor. That is very radical. That's divine nature. Truth be told, we do not like to be associated with the poor, we avoid the poor, and we have disdain in our hearts for the poor whether we like to admit it or not. That's human nature.

So in this season of Advent and Christmas, I want us to think about and look at the poor through God's eyes as the people Jesus so loved and liked to hang out with. One of the best stories of Rome that I will always treasure in my heart is Martha Berry teaching and preaching to the poor (Yes, she taught Sunday School and led Sunday worship). I love the way she empowered them by giving them (the poor) a motto to live by: "Not to be ministered unto but to minister." What a way of giving them a sense of purpose and worth! How can we be more like Martha Berry; moreover, how can we be more like Jesus who was with the poor, empowered them and gave them the Kingdom of God?

Traditionally, in the church we have offered direct services, meaning provided food, clothing, and monetary assistance, etc. In a sense it is giving them the "fish." We have also provided education. I want you to be proud of our United Methodist Denomination for we have been providing education to the poor for as long as we have existed. We are the best example of all the denominations in providing education to the poor. In a sense, this is teaching them "how to fish." But it is important for us to see and listen to the poor and know what is constantly holding them back. Sometimes, it is the redlining, discrimination, crimes, and gangs, etc.; there are bigger issues and systemic issues. Wherever there is injustice and evil, the church needs to be a beacon of justice and goodness. No matter how well the poor knows how to fish, if there is a permanent wall around the lake barring them from entering, how are they to feed themselves and their families? Helping the poor is like peeling an onion. There are many layers of complex issues. So we do not brush them off as "lazy" or "smelly" but instead try to listen to them and try to be an agent of bringing a solution to root causes. It sounds grand but it all starts with seeing them with God's eyes as people created in God's image.


