"Camp Meeting"

In the good ol' days when the south had very few church facilities and even fewer ordained clergy, for the majority of people living outside of cities, the only communal worship service was offered by circuit riders (traveling or itinerant preachers). Occasionally different communities would gather together in one outdoor location and hold revivals and they were called "camp meetings." These camp meetings, lasting several days, were a central feature of the religious life in the South and played a major role in leading people to Christ. Deeply emotional and evangelical, camp meetings are credited with moral reform and the rapid growth of church membership until 1840s when the established meeting-houses (church buildings) began to replace them. In the late 19th century, the movement reappeared in Appalachia as Holiness groups and in the Methodist Church, we revived camp-meetings as a beloved tradition and a time of great spiritual awakening. From July 14 to August 18, we will be having a camp meeting style worship experience. Rev. Millie will be preaching familiar stories from the Bible. We will sing familiar hymns from the Cokesbury hymnal and you are invited to dress more casually during Camp Meeting. It will be a good ol' time! So y'all come and invite your friends and neighbors!

A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR



The Parable of the Good Samaritan is not just a familiar story among Christians but also in our popular culture. It all started with a scribe spotlighting Jesus by asking a question. It is recorded in Luke 10:25 that the scribe did this to test Jesus, not for his own learning or edification. Jesus, like Socrates, throws the ball back to the scribe by asking, "What is written in the Law? How do you read it?" Now, the scribe is learned and sophisticated, and of course, gives him the right answer: Shema (Please read Deuteronomy 6:4-5, Leviticus 19:18).

The scribe's purpose was to test Jesus but Jesus had gained the upper hand by forcing the scribe to answer his own question. In addition, Jesus wanted him not just to answer the question but put his answer to practice. In Jewish

Culture, the study of the Law is of higher rank than practicing it. But Jesus turns it upside down by commanding, "Do this and you will live." "Do this you will inherit eternal life." and "Go and do likewise."

Then it says that the scribe, wanting to justify himself, asked another question, "Who is my neighbor?" We often think it was a technical question, but no, it was a loaded question, a controversial one. It really was asking, "Are you complying with the social norm?" "Are you on my level?" and "Are you with me?" He really wanted to get at Jesus and asked a question that has always created a controversy in Jewish culture. You see, the 1st century life (Judaism) was ordered by hierarchy/boundaries with strict mores. A few men established their positions, power, and privilege, and for them maintaining the hierarchy was vital. It was almost a religious duty to keep the boundaries drawn between the haves and have-nots, the educated and the illiterate, men and women, Jews and Gentiles, etc. Samaritans are not even included in those boundaries because they are dogs! So to say that even a Samaritan can be his neighbor was absolutely scandalous.

Neighbors are defined actively, not passively; they are defined by what they do. Jesus says that anyone who shows mercy (here in this context, it means loving kindness, 'hesed,' a characteristic of God) is a good neighbor. And if we want to have a good neighbor, we need to be good neighbors, too. The duty of neighborliness is an expression of God's mercy, loving-kindness, 'hesed.' We are not talking about kindness as the world knows it. It is loving-kindness as a characteristic of God. God's mercy is unconditional, has no strings attached, and expects nothing in return! This month you will have many opportunities to be a good neighbor. Here are a few: (1) Help out Valerie Moore with your money and/or prayer; (2) Be present at Vacation Bible School and greet children; (3) Help out Axel Baleon with his college preparation, etc. Just do it!



Thousands of North Georgia Methodists and guests arrived in Athens for the four day 2019 Annual Conference presided over by Bishop Sue Haupert-Johnson.

Four worship services anchored the conference, each planned by a different team of North GA United Methodists. The services progressed through the stages of worship. The first included "Gathering". The second was The Word Proclaimed (Service of Remembrance) with Dr. David Neglee. Thursday was A Time of "Response (Ordination) with Rev. Dr. Alice Rogers and Friday was Sending Forth (Closing) with Rev. Dr. Michael McQueen

Members of this conference elected lay and clergy delegates to the 2020 United Methodist General and Jurisdictional Conferences. Rev. Dr. Millie Kim was elected as a clergy representative to the Jurisdictional Conference.

Rome-Floyd Religious Leaders Luncheon at the Rome-Floyd Chamber June 21, 2019

Millie and I attended the Rome-Floyd Religious Leaders Luncheon at the Rome-Floyd Chamber, sponsored by Georgia Power (GPC) last month.

The purpose of the meeting was to inform various religious leaders in our community about the various programs that Georgia Power provides to who they called "underserved customers" such as those with low incomes, and also minorities.

The meeting focused on several issues that confront customers who are dis-advantaged and need additional help with their electric bills and service from Georgia Power.

With the closing of most all the GPC Business Offices around the state, this has left many customers, mostly poor, who don't have a checking account or access to online bill payment services with having to find a new places and new methods to pay their bill. GPC has added more than 4,000 Authorized Payment Locations (APLs) so you can pay your electric bill when you shop at retailers such as Kroger, Walmart, Publix, Kmart, and many others.

Many of these people are the same ones that need assistance with paying their bill and come to churches and other non-profit organizations like Good Neighbor Ministries for assistances. GPC has set up an online Portal that allows organizations to access the GPC customer's account and make payments directly to GPC on behalf of the customer. Also, they have established an organization within the company – the Energy Assistance Team – to provide education and outreach to these customers. We plan to have them for a Wednesday Night program.

GPC also seeks to have a presence in each community and supports several foundations and non-profits around the state that provide services to Low Income families whose electric bill exceeds a certain percent of their income – the High Energy Burden families. Services include free energy audits to help reduce energy bills by insulating the home and with other low cost methods to reduce consumption for eligible customers. An example is the Refrigerator Recycling Program: GPC will pick up and recycle an old refrigerator that you may have hanging around but not really using. Old refrigerators contain over 120 pounds of recyclable steel, copper, and other materials and costs about twice as much to run as a new one. You earn \$35.00 credit on your electric bill.

Georgia Power residential customers can also get discounted ENERGY STAR® certified LED bulbs which use less than 20% of electricity as conventional bulbs. These bulbs are available at many local retailers such as Home Depot, Ace True Value hardware stores and the Habitat for Humanity Restore on Shorter Ave. Limit of 16 bulbs per household.

Emergencies and challenging economic times often make it difficult for people to acquire food, shelter, clothing and medical supplies or even pay their utility bills. GPC supports a program called Project SHARE which provides a way for you to help those truly in need. By making a donation on your Georgia Power bill, you'll help Project SHARE and The Salvation Army make a difference in your community. Simply adding \$1, \$2, \$5 or \$10 to your electric bill payment, and Georgia Power will match your monthly donation.
